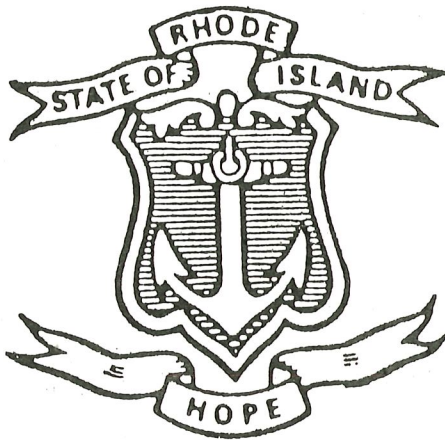


Dear Governor Sundlun:

## **Crime Factors**

Data users are cautioned against comparing statistical data of individual cities and towns due to numerous factors which are known to affect the amount and type of crime occurring from place to place.

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part
- Variations in composition particularly to youth concentration
- Economic status, including job availability, median income, and poverty level
- Stability of population with respect to residents' mobility, commuting factors, and other transient factors
- Modes of transportation and highway system
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics
- Effective strength of the law enforcement agencies
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement
- Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to UCR Crime Reporting Standards

## ***PROFILE OF RHODE ISLAND***

Rhode Island, the Ocean State, is the smallest state in the Union. The total area is 1,545 square miles, of which 1,045 square miles is land. The greatest length of the state is 48 miles, and greatest width is 37 miles.

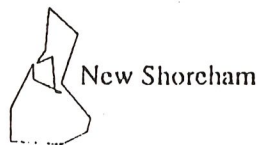
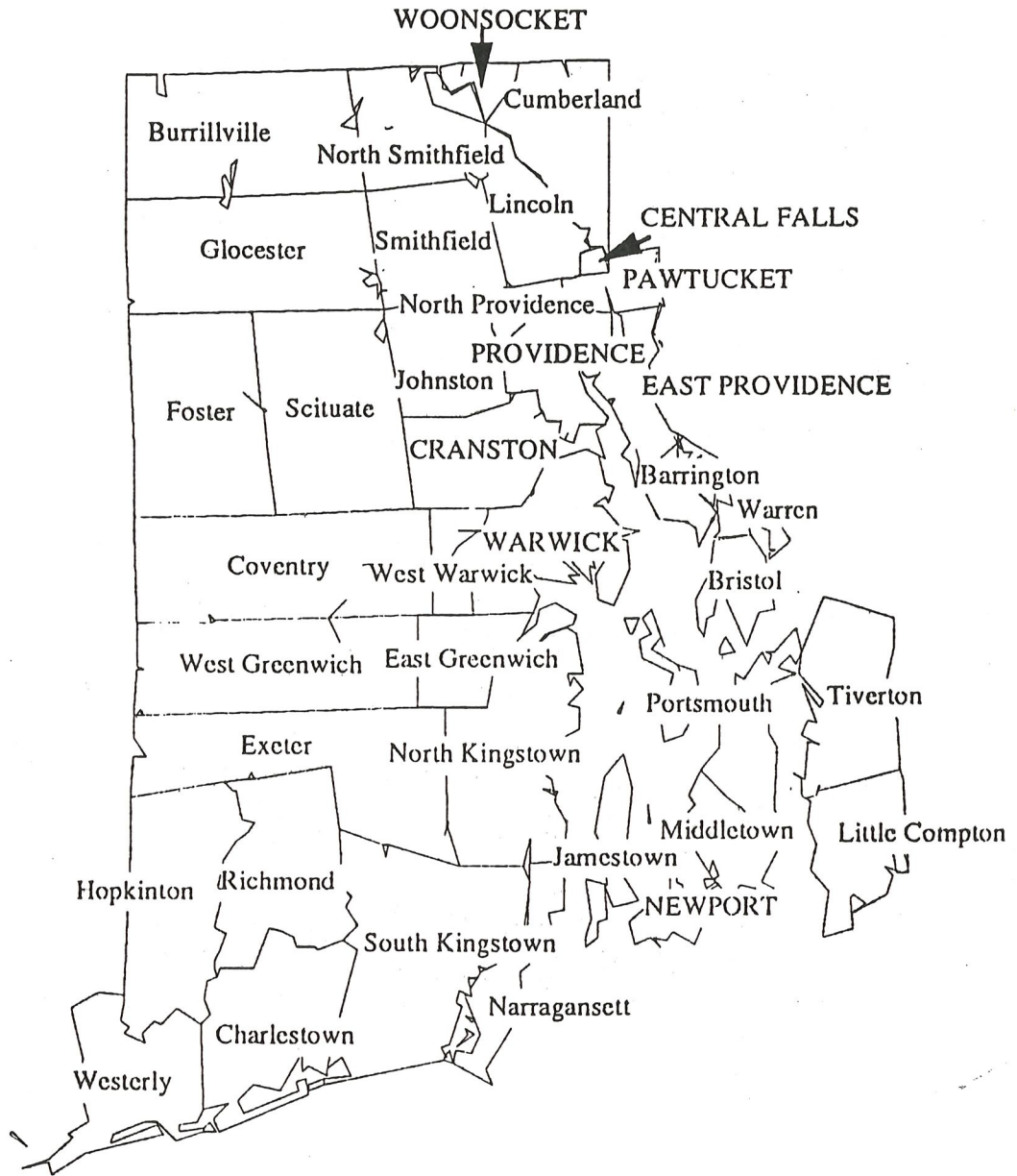
According to the 1990 U.S. Census, the population is 1,003,464 making Rhode Island the second most densely populated state - 960 people per square mile. Rhode Island's 1.3 million people represent 0.4 percent of the total United States Population.

The state is divided into 5 counties, comprised of 8 cities and 31 towns. A total of 39 municipalities as well as several state agencies contribute to the Uniform Crime Reports Program.

## THE UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

As per Rhode Island General Laws, the responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Rhode Island Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the Superintendent of the State Police. The Uniform Crime Reporting System provides a view of crime based on the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all Rhode Island law enforcement agencies. The success of the UCR is due to the full cooperation of law enforcement officials.

The UCR Unit submits crime data to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a nationwide crime study. The FBI publishes and distributes a yearly analysis - **Crime in the United States** as a result of the crime study. ### INCIDENT BASED REPORTING

Through the support of federal funds from the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the Rhode Island State Police have undertaken the task of implementing an Incident Based Reporting System. Implementation Guidelines and Automated Data Collection Specifications are listed in Volume 1 through Volume 4, published by the FBI. This Incident Based Reporting System is a less restrictive and more detailed reporting system as opposed to the current summary reporting system.

The legislature created and funded the Criminal Juvenile Justice Information System (CJIS) which has been delegated to achieve a more comprehensive crime information system in Rhode Island to meet the needs of all agencies. Criminal justice agencies included in this plan are: Rhode Island State Police, Local Law Enforcement Agencies, Department of Public Defender, Department of Attorney General, Courts, Rhode Island Judicial System and Sciences, Department of Corrections, Adult Correctional Institutions, Adult Probation and Parole, and the Department for Children and Their Families.

An intensive study of the crime information system, designed by Maximus, Inc., a technical consulting management firm of Virginia, was launched. The Incident Based Reporting System, based on the federal specifications, was included in this master plan. Statewide conversion to Incident Based Reporting has not yet become a reality.

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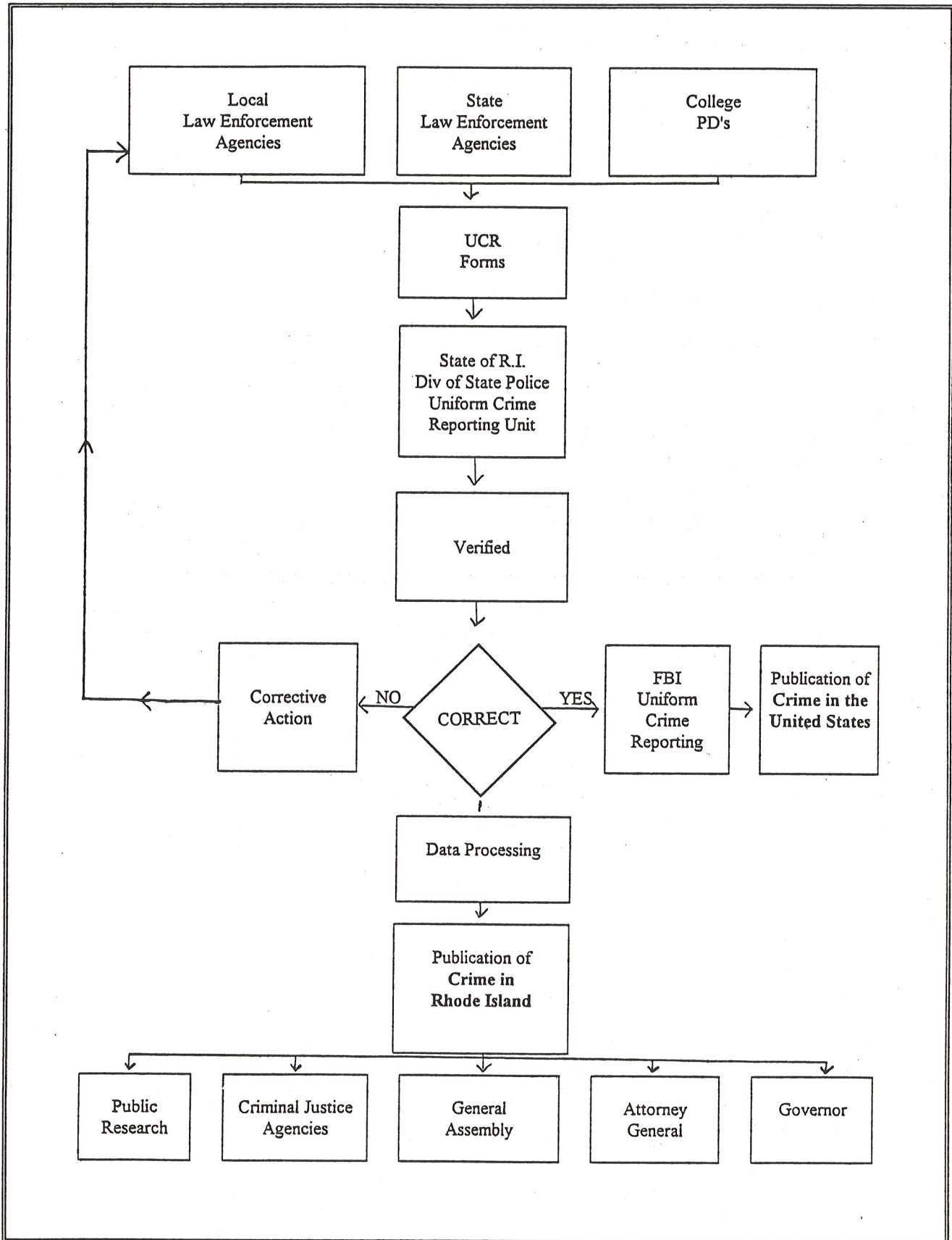
### NEWS BRIEF

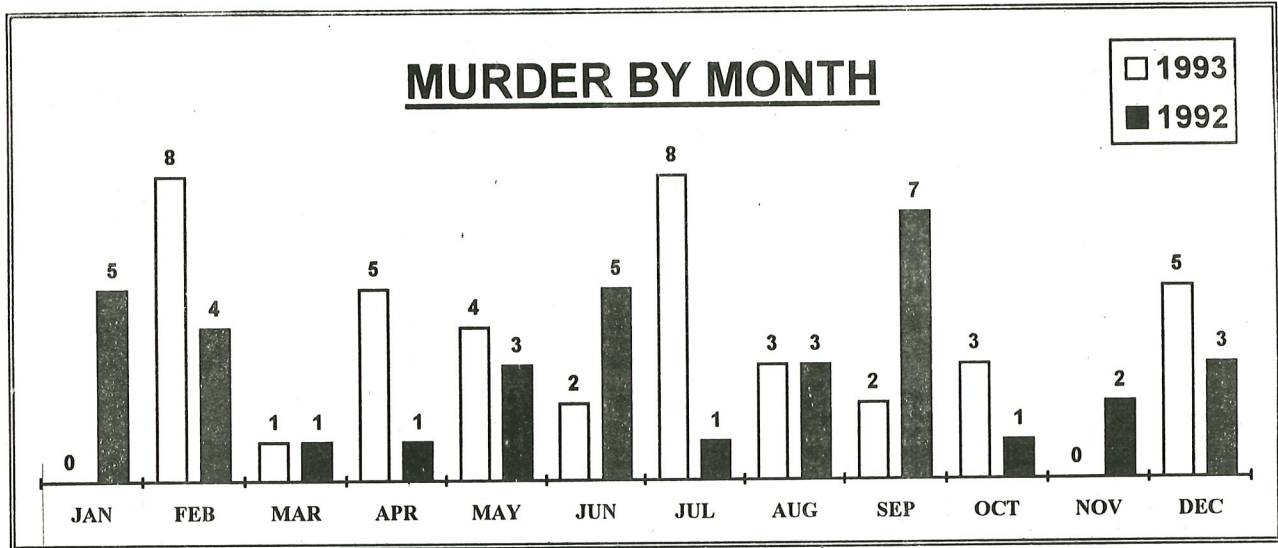

This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of the offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

### WEAPON PERCENT DISTRIBUTION

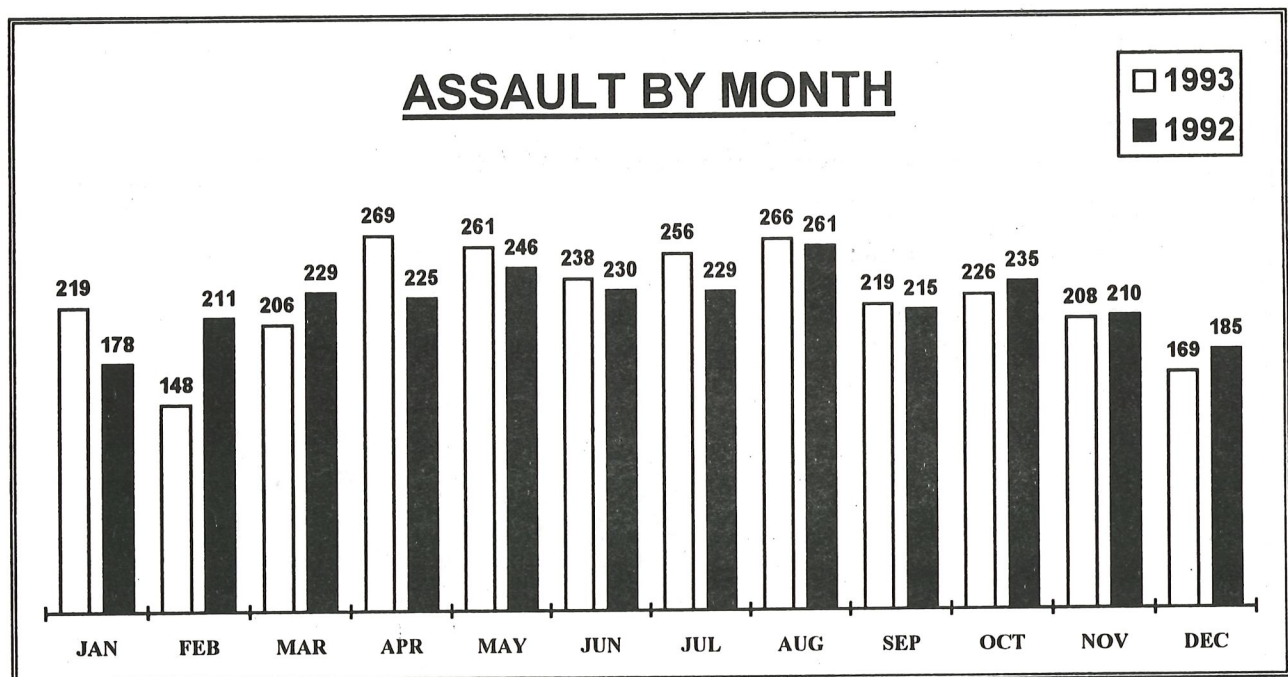

## *Hate Crime Data Collection Background*

Crimes motivated by bigotry and bias are an important concern of society. In response to this growing concern, authorization for hate crime data collection in Rhode Island was passed. Rhode Island General Law, Section 42-28-46 assigns responsibility to the Rhode Island State Police to monitor the occurrence of hate crimes committed.

This law was instituted to capture essential data in an effort to identify the hate crime problem. Statewide data collection allows the detailed examination of Hate Crime trends and will assist with crime prevention training and techniques.

Rhode Island Law Enforcement agencies report the monthly occurrence of such crimes to the Uniform Crime Reports Unit, where a record of these offenses is analyzed and maintained. These published statistics are a direct result of the data collection process.

Hopefully the information provided in this publication will be of value to society and increase the understanding as to what constitutes a hate crime. Not only is an individual victimized but an entire class of individuals.

### DEFINITION

"Any crime motivated by bigotry and bias, including, but not limited to threatened, attempted, or completed acts that appear after investigation to have been motivated by racial, religious, ethnic, sexual orientation, gender or disability prejudice."

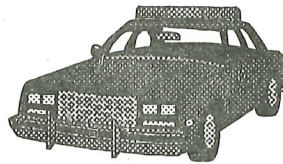

## ***Missing & Exploited Children's Unit Data Collection Background***

As per Rhode Island General Laws, Chapter 28.8, the Missing & Exploited Children's Unit was established in 1986 under the jurisdiction of the superintendent of the Rhode Island State Police.

Police departments of each city and town of the state "immediately" enter missing person information into the national crime information center computer and send a report form to the State Police. Monthly reports on missing and recovered persons are compiled, computerized and sent to the State Department of Vital Statistics and the Department of Education to flag records of missing children.

The Missing & Exploited Children's Unit serves as the State's Clearinghouse for the National Center for Missing Children in Washington, D.C. The National Center provided the Rhode Island State Police with a IBM Compatible Computer and the software capability to communicate directly with other state clearinghouses, as well as the National Center. Ms. Isabelle Verducci, Rhode Island Clearinghouse Manager, has obtained specialized clearinghouse training provided by the National Clearinghouse.

## *Domestic Violence*



**DOMESTIC VIOLENCE TRAINING & MONITORING UNIT  
BACKGROUND**

The Domestic Violence Training and Monitoring Unit, referred to as the Domestic Violence Unit (DVU), operates as a joint effort between the Rhode Island Supreme Court and Rhode Island Department of the Attorney General. While funded by the Supreme Court, the Unit has been on loan to the Attorney General's Office since the passage of the 1988 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PREVENTION ACT (DVPA), Rhode Island's first comprehensive domestic violence criminal legislation.

The DVU has been in existence in some form since 1981. From 1981 to 1986 it was known as the Domestic Violence Project and worked out of the no longer existing Rhode Island Department of Community Affairs. It was during that time period that the Project began its liaison work with Rhode Island law enforcement on the behalf of victims of domestic violence. It was also during this period that the Project, in concert with the Rhode Island Coalition Against Domestic Violence (RICADV), began its lobbying efforts at the General Assembly to improve the criminal justice response to victims of domestic violence. The 1988 DVPA transferred the Project, which consisted of one state salaried position, to the Rhode Island Supreme Court budget, thereby creating the Domestic Violence Training and Monitoring Unit (Rhode Island General Law 12-29- 6).

Historically, the DVU has been active in most phases of domestic violence prevention work including policy, planning, victim contact, victim advocacy, and education as well as the all - important victim/police liaison work.

With the passage of the 1988 DVPA several new mandates were statutorily assigned to the Unit. Those mandates include: the development and delivery of a domestic violence curricula for recruits and in-service training of Rhode Island law enforcement personnel; the development and delivery of training for probation officers in screening abusers for appropriate counseling; the responsibility for the design and collection of domestic violence police reporting forms, known as DV-1's; the design and collection of medical reporting forms; and the development of such other data collection and assessment tools as are necessary to monitor the implementation of the 1988 DVPA.

In 1991, Rhode Island General Law 12-29-6.1, an amendment to the 1988 DVPA, created "The Domestic Violence Training and Monitoring Unit Fund" to be administered by the Rhode Island Supreme Court solely for the administrative expenses of the DVU. While in 1994 the DVU still consists of one state salaried position, the DVU Fund provides for the salary of an administrative aide through a private, temporary employment agency. The Unit also makes use of university and state inter programs.

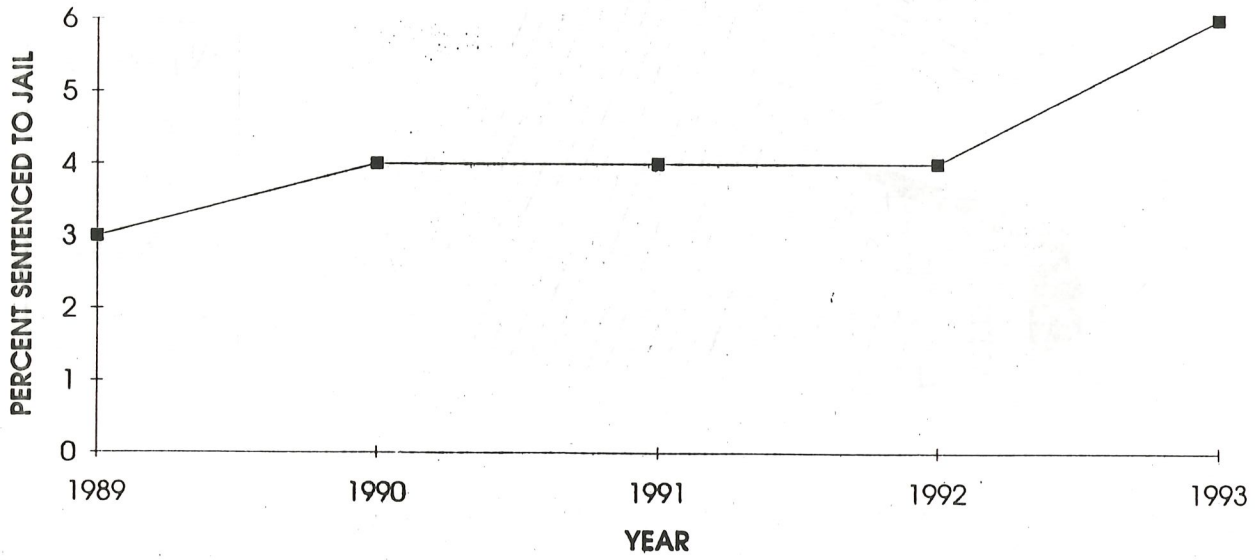
The DVU compiles domestic violence statistics on the incidence of domestic violence through police DV-1's; however, the statistics remain somewhat skewed due to the less than 100 percent compliance from all police officers. The RICADV also collects statistics through their victim advocacy court program, rather than through police reports. Coalition findings were used in compiling the graphs listed on the following pages.

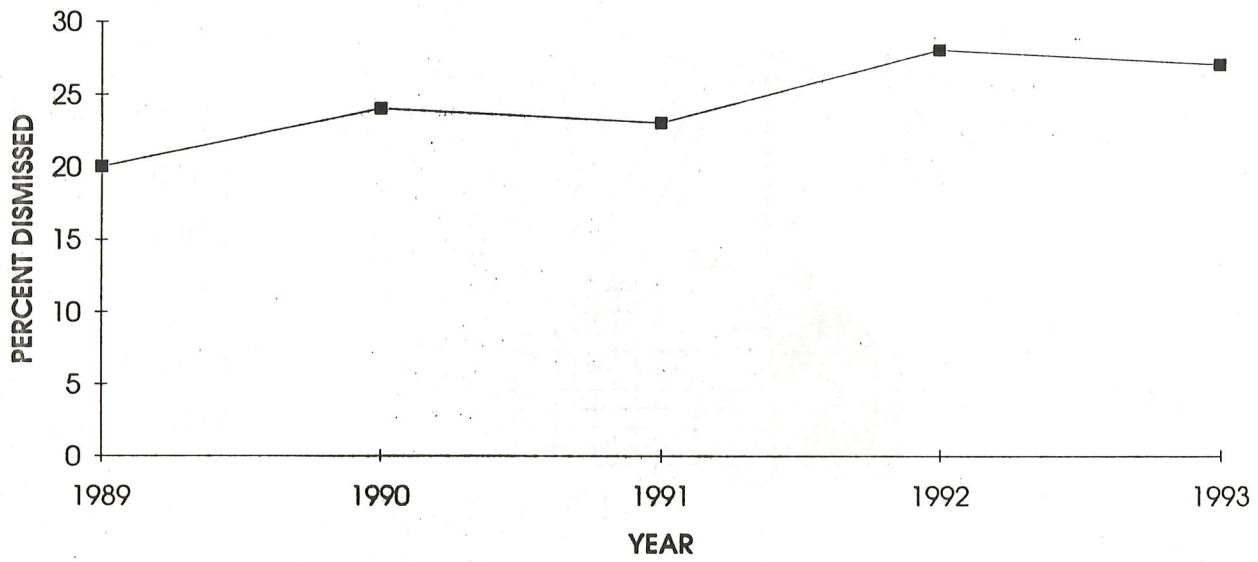

# *Appendix*



## UCR Part I Offenses

### **CRIMINAL HOMICIDE**

#### **a. Criminal Homicide - Murder and Non negligent Manslaughter:**

The willful (non negligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded. Justifiable homicides are limited to: (1) the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and (2) the killing (during the commission of a felony) of a felon by a private citizen.

#### **b. Manslaughter by negligence:**

The killing of another person through gross negligence. Deaths resulting from traffic accidents are not included in this classification.

### **FORCIBLE RAPE**

The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Included are rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape. Statutory offenses (no force used - victim under legal age of consent) are excluded.

### **ROBBERY**

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

### **AGGRAVATED ASSAULT**

The unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed. Attacks using personal weapons (part of the attacker's body) must result in serious personal injury to be classified as aggravated assault. Simple assaults are excluded from this count.

### **BURGLARY**

The unlawful entry of a "structure" to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify the crimes as burglary. Burglary is broken down into three sub classifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry. A "structure" is considered to include the following, but not limited to: dwelling houses, apartments, out buildings, public buildings, offices, factories, barns, cabins, etc.

### **LARCENY**

The unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles without the use of force, violence, or fraud. This includes crimes such as shoplifting, purse snatching, pocket picking, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle theft, etc. This crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is excluded from this category.

### **MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**

The unlawful taking or stealing of motor vehicle, including attempts. This definition excludes taking for temporary use by those persons having lawful access to the vehicle.

UCR defines a motor vehicle as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the ground and not on rails. Examples include automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, mopeds, snowmobiles, etc. Thefts of construction equipment, boats, and airplanes are not included in this category but are counted as larcenies.

### **ARSON**

The willful or malicious burning of property with or without the intent to defraud. Includes attempts. (Although arson is considered a Part I Crime, sufficient data is not available to provide totals for this offense. The number of arsons is not included in the crime tables listed in this publication.)

## Part 2 Offenses

### **OTHER (SIMPLE) ASSAULTS**

An unlawful attack or attempted attack upon another which does not result in serious injury to the victim and which does not involve the use of a dangerous weapon.

### **FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING**

The making, altering, using or possession, with intent to defraud, of anything false which is made to appear true. Includes attempts.

### **FRAUD**

Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, confidence games, illegal conversion of services, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

### **EMBEZZLEMENT**

Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control. Includes larceny from employer.

### **STOLEN PROPERTY**

The buying, receiving, and possession of stolen property, or the attempt to do so.

### **VANDALISM**

The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of real or personal property without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control. Includes attempts.

### **WEAPONS**

All violations of regulations or statutes that control carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing deadly weapons or silencers. Includes attempts.

### **PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE**

Sex offenses and attempted sex offenses of a commercialized nature. Includes prostitution, keeping houses of ill fame, pandering, detaining women for immoral purposes, etc.

### **ALL OTHER SEX OFFENSES**

All other offenses against common decency and morals. Includes statutory rape (without force) and all other sex offenses not previously defined.

### **DRUG LAWS**

The unlawful possession, sale, use, growth or manufacture of controlled substances. For UCR purposes these offenses are broken down into four groups: a. Opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine), b. Marijuana, c. Synthetic narcotics - manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction, d. Dangerous non-narcotic drugs.

### **GAMBLING**

Promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling. Includes bookmaking, numbers and lottery, etc.

### **OFFENSES AGAINST THE FAMILY OR CHILDREN**

All charges of nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family or children. Note: Most child abuse, especially that resulting in injury, has been classified as either simple or aggravated assault.

### **DRIVING WHILE IMPAIRED**

Operating any motor vehicle or common carrier while under the influence of liquor or drugs.

### **LIQUOR LAWS**

Violation of state or local regulatory laws. Includes sale to minors and drinking on a public conveyance. This category excludes Driving While Impaired and Drunk and Disorderly violations.

### **DISORDERLY CONDUCT**

Breaching the peace or attempting to do so. Includes violations of disturbing the peace, unlawful assembly, and drunk and disorderly.

### **VAGRANCY**

Violation of state or local statutes pertaining to being a "suspicious character or person", vagrancy, etc.

### **ALL OTHER OFFENSES**

All violations of state or local regulatory laws except traffic offenses and offenses defined above or below. Includes kidnapping, extortion, trespass, etc.

### **CURFEW AND LOITERING LAWS**

Juvenile violations of local curfew and loitering ordinances.

### **RUNAWAY (JUVENILES)**

The unlawful truancy from a legal place of residence by a juvenile.

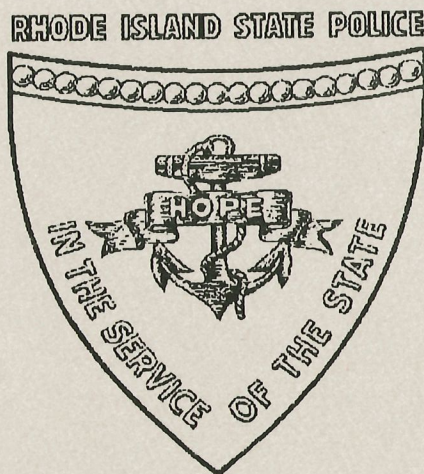
