#### Law Enforcement Code of Ethics

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department.

Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty. I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decision. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence. I will strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession... law enforcement.

#### **Crime Factors**


Data users are cautioned against comparing statistical data of individual cities and towns due to numerous factors which are known to affect the amount and type of crime occurring from place to place.

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part
- Variations in composition particularly to youth concentration
- Economic status, including job availability, median income, and poverty level
- Stability of population with respect to residents' mobility, commuting factors, and other transient factors
- Modes of transportation and highway system
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics
- Effective strength of the law enforcement agencies
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement
- Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to UCR Crime Reporting Standards

#### The Uniform Crime Reporting System

#### Chapter 24

- 12-24-1. Reporting System. -- A uniform crime reporting system shall be established under the direction, control and supervision of the superintendent of state police. The superintendent of state police shall have the power and duty, by such rules and regulations as he may deem necessary to collect and gather such information from such local police departments and the enforcement division of the department of environmental management as may be and is hereinafter prescribed.
- 12-24-2. Reports. -- The police department of each city and town and the enforcement division of the department of environmental management, once each quarter, upon a date and form prescribed and furnished by the superintendent of state police, shall forward to the division of state police a crime report. Each reporting department shall report only on cases within its jurisdiction and upon which it is making, or has made, the primary police investigation. The report shall be called the uniform crime report and shall cover crimes reported and otherwise processed during the reporting period. It shall contain the number and nature of offenses committed, the disposition of such offenses and such other information as the superintendent of state police shall specify relating to the method, frequency, cause and prevention of crime. Under no circumstances shall the name of any person be reported.
- 12-24-3. Compilation of Reports. -- Upon receipt of the quarterly uniform crime reports from the reporting agencies, the division of state police shall prepare a statewide compilation of the statistics contained therein and the resulting statistical compilation shall be available to any governmental law enforcement agency in the state, the judiciary committees of the Rhode Island senate and the Rhode Island house of representatives, and the federal bureau of investigation, upon request. The statistics made available through the uniform crime report shall be used for the purpose of studying the causes, trends and effects of crime in this state and for intelligence upon which to base a more sound program of crime detection and prevention and the apprehension of criminals.
- 12-24-4. Other Agencies. -- Any governmental agency, not falling within the description of those required to submit the quarterly uniform crime report set forth in 12-24-2, which desires to submit such a report, shall be furnished with the proper forms by the division of state police. When a report is received by the division of state police from a governmental police agency not required to make such reports, the information contained therein shall be included within the monthly compilation provided for in 12-24-3.

### Crime in Rhode Island 1995 Facts at a Glance

- In 1995, 42,039 crime index offenses were reported by local law enforcement agencies. This is an increase of 2.4 percent from the total of 41,045 reported in 1994.
- Crime index offenses include: murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny theft, and motor vehicle theft.
- The crime rate per 100,000 population was 4,189.4 compared with 4,090.3 in 1994.
- The total number of reported violent index crimes (murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) was 3,659. This represents a decrease of 2.5 percent from the total of 3,752 reported in 1994.
- Collectively, property crimes (burglary, larceny theft and motor vehicle theft) increased by 3 percent from 37,293 reported in 1994 to 38,380 reported in 1995.
- There were 57 bias/hate crime incident offenses reported by local law enforcement in 1995, a 54 percent increase compared to 1994.
- Local law enforcement agencies reported 41,830 arrests in 1995, a 1.6 percent increase compared to 41,159 in 1994.
- Arrests for driving while under the influence decreased 2 percent from 1,971 in 1994 to 1,930 in 1995. Arrests for liquor law violations decreased 18.4 percent from 1,398 in 1994 to 1,140 reported in 1995.
- In 1995, 4,245 arrests for drug abuse violation were reported by local law enforcement agencies. This is an increase of 6.3 percent from the total of 3,993 reported in 1994.
- The total number of motor vehicle thefts (including automobiles, trucks, buses and other vehicles) was 4,359. This represents a decrease of 16 percent from the total of 5,190 reported in 1994.
- There were 628 police officers assaulted during 1995, a 4.2 percent decrease compared to the 656 assaulted in 1994.






# Domestic Violence Training and Monitoring Unit 29 Supreme Court

The Supreme Court/Domestic Violence Training and Monitoring Unit (DVU) used three sources in putting together the following pages of domestic violence statistics. The sources used are the following:

- 1. RIJSS, Rhode Island Judicial Systems and Sciences (Court computer system).
- 2. RICADV, Rhode Island Coalition Against Domestic Violence
- 3. DV-1's (mandated domestic violence police reporting forms) to DVU

In coordinating statistics from the above three data sources, it is clear that we have some work to do in Rhode Island in terms of coordinating domestic violence data collection.

Providence County and Bristol County 1995 misdemeanor cases are in the RIJSS computer system. Washington County, Newport County and Kent County 1995 misdemeanor cases are not in the RIJSS computer system. They were hand-entered into Court Docket Books. Washington County is now on line with RIJSS for 1996 cases, and discussions are taking place regarding Newport County and Kent County.

There are significant differences in the statistics shown by RIJSS and RICADV regarding numbers of dv crimes and dv sentences. This <u>may</u> be attributed to different methods of collecting and counting. We will look to this in 1996.

There remain problems with the collection of DV-1 forms. It is anticipated that this situation will greatly improve in 1996.





# Domestic Violence Crimes Providence & Bristol Counties\* 1995





# Sentences For Domestic Violence Cases Providence & Bristol Counties\* 1995






# Dispositions for Domestic Violence Crimes Providence & Bristol Counties\* 1995



# Appendix

#### **UCR Part I Offenses**

#### **CRIMINAL HOMICIDE**

a. Criminal Homicide - Murder and Non negligent Manslaughter:

The willful (non negligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded. Justifiable homicides are limited to: (1) the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and (2) the killing (during the commission of a felony) of a felon by a private citizen.

#### b. Manslaughter by negligence:

The killing of another person through gross negligence. Deaths resulting from traffic accidents are not included in this classification.

#### FORCIBLE RAPE

The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Included are rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape. Statutory offenses (no force used - victim under legal age of consent) are excluded.

#### ROBBERY

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

#### AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

The unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or serious bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed. Attacks using personal weapons (part of the attacker's body) must result in serious personal injury to be classified as aggravated assault. Simple assaults are excluded from this count.

#### BURGLARY

The unlawful entry of a "structure" to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify the crimes as burglary. Burglary is broken down into three sub classifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used. and attempted forcible entry. A "structure" is considered to include the following, but not limited to: dwelling houses, apartments, out buildings, public buildings, offices, factories, barns, cabins, etc.

#### LARCENY

The unlawful taking or stealing of property or articles without the use of force, violence, or fraud. This includes crimes such as shoplifting, purse snatching, pocket picking, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle theft, etc. This crime category does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is excluded from this category.

#### MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

The unlawful taking or stealing of motor vehicle, including attempts. This definition excludes taking for temporary use by those persons having lawful access to the vehicle.

UCR defines a motor vehicle as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the ground and not on rails. Examples include automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, mopeds, snowmobiles, etc. Thefts of construction equipment, boats, and airplanes are not included in this category but are counted as larcenies.

#### **ARSON**

The willful or malicious burning of property with or without the intent to defraud. Includes attempts. Although arson is considered a Part 1 Crime, sufficient data is not available to provide totals for this offense. The number of arsons is not included in the crime tables listed in this publication.)

#### Part 2 Offenses

OTHER (SIMPLE) ASSAULTS

An unlawful attack or attempted attack upon another which does not result in serious injury to the victim and which does not involve the use of a dangerous weapon.

#### FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

The making, altering, using or possession, with intent to defraud, of anything false which is made to appear true. Includes attempts.

#### FRAUD

Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, confidence games, illegal conversion of services, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

#### **EMBEZZLEMENT**

Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control. Includes larceny from employer.

#### STOLEN PROPERTY

The buying, receiving, and possession of stolen property, or the attempt to do so.

The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement or real or personal property without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control. Includes attempts.

#### WEAPONS

All violations of regulations or statutes that control carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing deadly weapons or silencers. Includes attempts.

#### PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Sex offenses and attempted sex offenses of a commercialized nature. Includes prostitution, keeping houses of ill fame, pandering, detaining women for immoral purposes, etc.

#### **ALL OTHER SEX OFFENSES**

All other offenses against common decency and morals. Includes statutory rape (without force) and all other sex offenses not previously defined.

#### **DRUG LAWS**

The unlawful possession, sale, use, growth or manufacture of controlled substances. For UCR purposes these offenses are broken down into four groups: a. Opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine), b. Marijuana, c. Synthetic narcotics - manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction , d. Dangerous non-narcotic drugs.

#### **GAMBLING**

Promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling. Includes bookmaking, numbers and lottery, etc.

#### OFFENSES AGAINST THE FAMILY OR CHILDREN

All charges of nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family or children. Note: Most child abuse, especially that resulting in injury, has been classified as either simple or aggravated assault.

#### DRIVING WHILE IMPAIRED

Operating any motor vehicle or common carrier while under the influence of liquor or drugs.

#### LIOUOR LAWS

Violation of state or local regulatory laws. Includes sale to minors and drinking on a public conveyance. This category excludes Driving While Impaired and Drunk and Disorderly violations.

#### DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Breaching the peace or attempting to do so. Includes violations of disturbing the peace, unlawful assembly, and drunk and disorderly.

#### **VAGRANCY**

Violation of state or local statutes pertaining to being a "suspicious character or person", vagrancy, etc.

#### **ALL OTHER OFFENSES**


All violations of state or local regulatory laws except traffic offenses and offenses defined above or below. Includes kidnapping, extortion, trespass, etc.

#### **CURFEW AND LOITERING LAWS**

Juvenile violations of local curfew and loitering ordinances.

#### **RUNAWAY (JUVENILES)**

The unlawful truancy from a legal place of residence by a juvenile.
